James Marquand Assistant State 4-H Leader

Jim Marquand was a distinuguished Ohio Extension faculty member from 1953-1982, beginning as Tuscarawas Co. 4-H agent. He later served as area agent and then Assistant State 4-H Leader and state specialist for 11 years. He made a major positive impact in 4-H curriculum, recognition, and resource development. Jim authored the first 4-H small animal curriculum materials. He originated the "Old McDonald's Farm" and interview judging concepts now used at many fairs. Jim was the first 4-H Agent ever elected President of the Ohio Extension Agent's Association, earned National Distinguished Service awards from NAE4-HA and NACAA, and was a leader in Epsilon Sigma Phi honorary extension fraternity, and Ohio Extension Professors Association.

Jim Marquand was an Ohio Extension faculty member from 1953-1982, beginning as Tuscarawas Co. 4-H agent, then as area agent, Assistant State 4-H Leader and State 4-H Specialist for 11 years. He made a major positive impact in 4-H curriculum, recognition, and resource development. He authored the first 4-H small animal projects, now used across the nation. In the mid-1960's, he originated the "Old McDonald's Farm" at a county fair to encourage youth interaction with animals and initiated the interview-judging process, both now used nationwide. As a state 4-H specialist in the early 1980's, Jim expanded the Ohio 4-H International Program and fostered the rapid expansion of the 4-H Labo Japanese Exchange Program. He continues to provide major support and volunteer leadership for international programs.

Jim was nominated for a 1978 USDA Honor Award for his work in 4-H literature. He developed the process of pilot-testing new 4-H project ideas and provided leadership for piloting 61 new projects. One project, Mrs. G. Arden's Green Scene, was awarded a top rating by the American Association of Agricultural College Editors. Jim strengthened the camping program at the county and state level, establishing the Jim Marquand Scholarship to support 4-H members to attend 4-H camp. Since his retirement in the early 1980's, Jim has continued as a volunteer to provide leadership, inspiration, and hard work for 4-H international programs, a multitude of 4-H fundraising campaigns, and expanding 4-H Small Animal programs. He and his family have been lead contributors in campaigns to support many 4-H efforts.

The following poem by one of his 4-H volunteers sums up how people view Jim and his character.

Jim was someone who was always at hand...

With a smile, and a word of good cheer.

He's someone who's thoughtful and loving and kind...

And who just grows increasingly dear.

James was happy, when there was a need...
