

Williams started as an Oklahoma county extension agent, served as Oklahoma State 4-H Program Leader and as Deputy Administrator, ES-USDA.

Eugene "Pete" Williams provided leadership for 4-H for 32 years starting as an Oklahoma county extension agent, then as Oklahoma State 4-H Program Leader, and ending his career as Deputy Administrator, ES-USDA. He was instrumental in advancing the Oklahoma 4-H agent from an assistant agent to a professional position and initiating the Oklahoma 4-H Agents Association.

Williams established the first adult volunteer training on the district and state level in Oklahoma. At USDA, he developed a strong working relationship between USDA, 4-H Council, and states, expanded 4-H into urban areas, and strengthened adult volunteer leader recognition.
